





When attempting to make your lifestyle more environmentally friendly it can seem overwhelming and it might be difficult to know where to start. Many everyday kitchen convenience items can have a long lasting impact on the environment. With a few simple choices, it's easy to make your kitchen more conservation conscience! Kitchen storage items can be wasteful and they all have green alternatives. How many plastic bags do you go through when packing your lunch, 2, 3 or more? CONSERVATION vs. CONVENIENCE

As we go about our daily lives we decide whether to choose convenience or conservation, plastic or planet and our day to day decisions make an impact on our planet. Everyone understands the detriment of disposable plastic bottles, but next to plastic bottles, single-serve coffee capsules are high up on the list of single-use items to purge from our lives. The rise in the popularity of capsule style machines has seen our usage of capsules both at home and at work skyrocket. Last year alone Keurig sold 9 billion K-Cups, the majority of which likely ended up in landfills.

How to make it better?

- 1. Recycle them... easier said than done. First you must separate the pod components. K-Cup® pods consist of a combination of plastic, aluminum, organic material (coffee grounds) and a paper filter. Most of these items cannot be recycled due to printing on the foil label and not being the type of plastic that is even recyclable. The paper and coffee grounds however could be placed in a composting bin.
- 2. Purchase a reusable K-Cup pod. You can find reusable K-Cup pods anywhere you can buy a single serve coffee maker.
- 3. Finally, please always use a good old-fashioned glass coffee cup to drink your coffee! Not only will your coffee taste better, but you will be doing your part in helping reduce, reuse, recycle and refuse!



Eco-friendly Hygiene

From the time you wake up to the time you go to bed, your life is consumed with plastic. Today we'll look into one of the integral parts of your morning routine: your bathroom. The toothbrush you use to keep your breath fresh...plastic. The razor to get rid of that 5 o'clock shadow...also plastic. That tube of your favorite fire engine red lipstick...you guessed it, plastic.

In 2016, the average American spent upward of \$170 on bath preparation products per year. This statistic doesn't include hair products, cosmetics, or even the bath tissue (If the cost of women's makeup is included, the cost is around \$3,090 annually!). But more important than cost is the amount of non-recyclable plastics included in all of this.

Most bathroom goods are not recyclable because either the product packaging is too small for a recycling plant to handle or the container itself is simply not made from recyclable plastics. However, there are a few alternatives to help minimize your plastic use. The first step is really considering if you need the newest body lotion or gel for your hair. Eliminating the urge to splurge excessively on products will help minimize the amount of plastics you own. Another option is considering making the switch to eco-friendly alternatives such as shampoo bars (instead of the standard bottles). They can be purchased for as low as \$12, use substantially less plastic than an entire bottle and last much longer than traditional bottled products. Finally, using homemade face wash or shaving cream will help reduce the use of flexible plastic container, those pesky non recyclables. With these few manageable steps, you can help reduce your plastic consumption and save the oceans.
